(For example: one common model is to introduce a concept, practice the concept with the entire class, practice in small groups, discuss as a class, and apply the concept to students' own writing.)
- 4. Describe the pacing of the class, considering: transitions between topics or activities, the order and flow, and the time spent on each element.
